- Volunteer extraordinaire Nancy Wingo, chair of the Hunger Task Force at Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church.
- Narberth's Natalie Connor, the unflappable VP and marketing manager of two Philly radio stations that couldn't be more different—92.5 WXTU-FM (country) and 96.5 WRDW-FM (hip-hop).
